### 1. INTRODUCTION

The Speaker formally referred the Social Security Agency Bill [B51B-2003], a Section 76 Bill to the Social Services and Population Development .Portfolio Committee for consideration and report in terms of Rule 6.49 (1) (c) on Wednesday, 12 November 2003. The Chairperson, Mr B. S. Nkosi, tabled a negotiating mandate on the Social Security Agency Eill as follows.

## 2. PROCESS FOLLOWED

The Chairperson of the Portfolio Committee attended a workshop by the National Assembly on the Social Security Agency Bill on Monday, 10 November 2003.

On Monday, 24 November 2003, the Committee received a briefing on the contents of the Bill from the permanent delegate in the NCOP, Ms L Jacobus and senior officials from the Provincial Department of Social Services and Population Development. The Committee deliberated on the contents of the Bill.

The Committee received a briefing by the Department of Social Services and Population Development senior officials, Mr P Lesufi and Mr G Rees on Thursday, 22 January 2004.

The Committee adopted the negotiating mandate on Nonday, 26 January 2004.

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#### 3. STAKEHOLDERS AND THE PUBLIC HEARING

The Social Services Portfolio Committee held a public hearing on both the Social Assistance Bill and the Social Security Agency Bill on Wednesday, 10 December 2003. The main purpose of the hearing was to engage with beneficiaries of social grants; social grant administrators; the Department of Social Services; as well as institutions caring for children, persons with disabilities and the aged to give their input and comment on the two Bills.

#### 4. THE OBJECTIVES OF BILL

The Committee was informed that the main aim of the Bill was to:

- Provide for the establishment of the South African Social Security Agency as an agent for the administration and payment of social assistance:
- Provide for the prospective administration and payment of social ii. security by the Agency and the provision of services related thereto: and
- Provide for matters connected therewith. iii.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS OF THE BILL FOR TI-E PROVINCE 5.

The implementation of this Bill will have implications for the Gauteng Province in that the direct transfers of the Provincial Department of Social Services and Population Development will be reduced by 80%. The province will also have to transfer some of their assets to the Agency once it is established.

#### 6. PRINCIPLE OF THE BILL

The Social Services and Population Portfolio Committee and the Gauteng Department of Social Services and Population Development support the principle and the detail of the Social Security Agency Eill [B51B - 2003].

- Provide for the establishment of an Inspectorate for Social Security. νi.

#### 5. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS OF THE BILL FOR THE PROVINCE

The implementation of this Bill will have implications for the Gauteng Province in that the direct transfers of the Provincial Department of Social Services and Population Development will be reduced by 80% due to the establishment of the Social Security Agency Bill [B51B - 2003].
