
National Library of South Africa



The National Library has significant numbers of donated private book collections, some of which remain open and continue to grow as relevant material is acquired. These include, amongst others, the following:

Sir George Grey donated his 5,000-volume collection to the Library in 1863. Many examples of early South and Southern African mission press publications can be found in the Grey Collection.










In this collection are examples of rare pamphlets published at stations such as Lovedale, Beersheba and Kuruman. These publications are the earliest printed texts in many Southern African languages.



Included in the Grey Collection are 117 medieval manuscripts and 119 incunabula (early printed books). There are also examples of the work of early European printers such as Caxton, Nicolas Jenson, and Peter Schoeffer, as well as the First and Second Folio of Shakespeare.











The National Library has over the years accumulated over 1,000 collections of manuscript material that provide a farreaching documentary record of the social, cultural, political and economic development of South Africa. Collections of personal papers include those of Jan Hendrik Hofmeyr, John X. Merriman, J.C. Molteno, W.P. Schreiner, Olive Schreiner, C.P. Hoogenhout, C. Louis Leipoldt, Ruth Prowse and John Knox Bokwe.



The National Library has extensive holdings of press images, including 50,000 negatives donated by the *Cape Times* newspaper, as well as 80,000+ photographic prints from *Die Burger* newspaper.














Sheet MAPS by early cartographers such as Ortelius, De Wit, Hondius, Moll, Blaeu, De l'Isle and Ottens are to be found at both campuses of the National Library. Maps produced by the British War Office during the South African War (1899-1902) are also held in the library's collections.







Preservation Services Programme

- The Preservation Services Programme strives to ensure the long-term availability and accessibility of South African knowledge resources through preservation of our collections.
- Reformatting of sources to minimize handling of fragile materials is done by copying material onto microfilm and microfiche, different electronic formats as well as duplicating photographs. Services include:

Centre for the Book

The National Library's Centre for the Book, in partnership with the Book Development Foundation promotes writing, publishing, reading, marketing and distribution of South African books in all South African languages. The Centre's First Words in Print project specifically speaks to the vision of a "multicultural and multilingual celebration of home-grown books" by publishing local stories in many South African languages, contributing to a truly South African literary culture.

The Legal Deposit Act

In terms of the Legal Deposit Act:

- South African publishers must supply to the National Library one copy of every book, serial, newspaper and other print and electronic items published in South Africa. The National Library collects, records, makes available (globally and locally) and preserves these national documentary heritage materials. It ensures that knowledge and information is not lost, and that it is available for future research.
- The National Librarys' collections contain a wealth of information sources. These national documentary heritage materials include rare manuscripts, books published in South Africa, periodicals, government publications, foreign official publications, maps, technical reports, books on specialized interests (including Africana material, newspapers, Photos and pamphlets). These are also be available on CD, microfilm, in digital format or on the web.
















National Library partners

NCLIS

The National Library of South Africa plays a significant role in the National Council for Libraries and Information Services, with the National Librarian serving as an exofficio member of the Council. A Consultative workshop on the review of six National Heritage Acts pertaining to LIS, Archives and Heraldry Legislation was jointly hosted by the Department of Arts and Culture (DAC) and the National Council for Libraries and Information Services. The purpose of the workshop was to align several related Acts with each other, as well as with Government policy. THE NATIONAL LIBRARY SA FULLY SUPPORTS THE DAC AND NCLIS INITIATIVES

AFRICAN RENNAISSANCE

The National Library of SA hosted a highly successful International workshop in March 2005 on "Information as a strategic Resource for Africa's Development. 
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
